| | a) Review of SBC grass cutting and maintenance of vegetation on roadside verges. Further discussion on this issue has been postponed until SBC staff involved are back in their usual pre-covid posts. | JG/BW |
| | b) Update on problem of overhanging shrubbery in Gavinton. JG was unable to attend the meeting and therefore an update was not available. AS to contact JG to find out if there has been any progress on this issue. | JG/AS |
| | c) Improvements to parking area at the football pitches, Gavinton. KD and AS had a brief meeting on 8 th March with Claire Simpson, Secretary of Duns Juniors, Devrim Turkay, Chairman of Duns JFC and Kevin Simpson representing Duns seniors. AS explained that the issue of parking on both sides of the main street near to the football grounds in Gavinton caused issues for residents with the road becoming too narrow, causing difficulty for cars and pedestrians and especially agricultural vehicles. KD explained the options suggested by Gary Haldane of SBC which included traffic regulation orders or verge marker posts. There was also discussion of the use of cones which although not legally enforceable could be put out by the football club to control parking. | AS/KD |

| 10 | Councillor Update Cllr John Greenwell was unable to attend the meeting and therefore his update was unavailable. | JG |
| | Cllr Mark Rowley updated the meeting on plans for cycle lanes and traffic calming through Duns, current plans should be available early next week for consultation. MR commented that an additional 15 million pounds has been made available in the Scottish Government budget for active travel routes and he will report back on how this funding may affect plans for active travel routes in the Borders. | MR |
| | Cllr Donald Moffat Cllr Moffatt informed the meeting of the spike in thefts of agricultural vehicles including quad bikes and asked CC to call 101 if they see anything suspicious. BW commented that he has heard from the victims of such thefts that they are not receiving sufficient feedback from the police on the progress of investigations. DM has a meeting with police on 9 th March and offered to pass on these comments and request better communication with the victims of these crimes. DM also informed the meeting that Gavinton is to receive a flashing speed limit sign on Main Street. The CC will be contacted as part of the consultation on the best position for the sign. | DM |

KD forwarded a link to this consultation to all CC members prior to the meeting and encouraged them to participate. On 9th March KD will attend a workshop associated with this consultation and wished to hear the opinions of the CC on the questions being asked at the meeting to help inform his discussion: What do we want the South of Scotland economy to look like in around 20 years' time (2040/2045)? What is driving our economy? Why is it a great place to: Live; Work; Visit; Learn; Operate; and Invest;?
